The green immaculate turf at Robert Smyth Academy was bristling with anticipation for the big match on Friday 27th of October 2023. The crowd had arrived in their masses to support this great event. Bright and beautiful banners were held aloft, and the scene was set for the much-anticipated clash of the Titans with a formidable line up of players old and new.
