Detentions change

We consider detentions a key component of our behaviour policy and whilst we have sought to accommodate those who catch buses, or have after-school commitments during lunchtime, this is something that is no longer feasible given the limited free space we have available during the school day. As a result, **lunchtime detentions will cease** <u>after half term and all detentions will take place after school</u> in Sixteen07, our school canteen.

Those who take school transport will be given 24-hours to seek alternative arrangements and only extenuating circumstances (such as medical appointments) will be considered as acceptable reasons for postponing a detention. Please note that after-school clubs will not be considered an acceptable reason for postponement. It is our hope that this will provide equity to the detention process and ensure that the sanction is facilitated more efficiently.

Break-time detentions will continue as a response to lateness at the beginning of the day, however students will no longer be permitted to acquire food from the canteen beforehand.

Year 7 Assembly

On Monday, both Ms Kirk (College Leader) and I led an assembly for all students in Year 7 to remind students of our expectations regarding high standards and expectations including the importance of respectful language. As part of this assembly, we discussed the importance of inclusive language and the potentially harmful impact of discriminatory comments. First and foremost, we have a duty to educate.

Students were provided with a reminder about the protected characteristics enshrined in law by the Equality Act (2010) and we decided that this was important given a small number of concerns that have been raised recently regarding inappropriate language that has been used by students in this year group.

We continue to promote the highest expectations for students, and this was a pertinent opportunity for our students to be give clarity about respectful conduct and how to report any concerns that they may have.

College Captain and Form Representative Selections

College Captain and Form Representative interviews have been a wonderful window into the amazing students we have at this school. We still have a few more to hold, therefore decisions will be made in the week we return after half term.

<u>VASL – Human Library Initiative</u> Written by Mrs. Coxon (Reading Coordinator and Librarian)

John, a VASL Community Champions and Transport volunteer, gave a Human Library talk to 30 students at Robert Smyth Academy about his varied 37-year career working for the prisons service.

John started his working life teaching and then in 1977 got what he thought would be a temporary job at HMP Manchester, known locally as Strangeways prison. Strangeways was a Victorian prison, built in 1868; where prisoners were locked up three in a cell with just a bucket (no toilet). John remembers entering the prison grounds and walking past poo parcels which inmates had thrown out of their cells to reduce smells. Another memory shared was how trusted prisoners known as Redbands, because they wore a red arm band, would make drinks for prison staff. Being a Redband was generally considered by prisoners to be a desirable job, but this still didn't stop one being discovered washing staff mugs with a toilet brush!

John started off as an Administrative Officer holding a variety of roles whilst at Strangeways, including as a Discipline clerk working out sentences and release dates. He later became a supernumerary travelling to different prisons in the North (e.g. Hull, Durham). In 1988 he was promoted and posted to HMP Gartree as an Executive Officer. Gartree, build in 1965, as a low-risk Category C prison with a working farm had, very quickly, been regraded to a category A Dispersal prison; one of only five dispersal prison in the country. Gartree prison became front page news when in 1987 it became the first prison in the UK to have two prisoners escape using a helicopter, both were recaptured, one after 10 days, and the other after a year. After this event, to prevent further helicopter escapes the prison service introduced overhead wires to open areas.

John's roles as an Executive Officer included being a Custody, Personnel, Training and Store Manager. He was also selected to work as clerk for the Board of Visitors and as a database administrator. All these roles gave him different insights into the way the prison functioned.

John explained prisons were like small towns – Gartree had kitchens where all food was prepared, an Education Department for prisoner learning, a Healthcare centre, a Chapel, a well-equipped sports centre, prison shop, workshops (e.g. textiles), Stores, Works, Probation, Psychology, Punishment, Therapy and Security departments. The prison employed people in a variety of roles such as prison officers, instructors, psychologist, electricians, plumbers, painters, health staff, teachers, chaplaincy, administration, etc. He also mentioned the special training prison officers undertook to be part of the Control and Restraint teams who were employed to deal with prison incidents.

Famous prisoners who spent time at Gartree include, Reggie Kray, one of the twins in charge of the gangster mob, The Firm; Ian Brady, the Moors murderer, Fred West a serial killer, Charles Bronson, Jeremy Bamber and Tony Martin. All these gained further notoriety through being featured in films or television programmes. John talked about miscarriages of justice when evidence supporting people's innocence was deliberately withheld and drew parallels with the Post Office scandal unfolding now.

Students, many who had family members who work in prisons, asked insightful questions about the culture in prisons, dealing with violence/riots, and about the new super prison that had just got planning permission. They thanked John for an illuminating talk.
