Reading for All

Reading is at the heart of the curriculum experience for our students because we believe that reading is one of life's profound joys. To this end, one of our whole school priorities is to continue to provide more opportunities for students to develop enjoyment, mastery and confidence in reading. It is for these reasons that we issue students with summer reading books in Key Stage 3 and we plan reading opportunities in Key Stage 4 and 5. We do not believe that reading should be the preserve of any group of students and we are ambitious that every child learns to enjoy reading including children with identified Special Educational Needs.

Last week, all teachers participated in additional training to consider the best evidenced based approaches to supporting children in school who had not yet gained confidence and fluency in reading whilst planning for reading opportunities for all throughout the curriculum and planned homework activities.

We have also adopted a strategy to support all students who are still developing confidence in reading because we believe that everyone deserves to feel confident in reading. These interventions include:

Phonics programme

Mrs. Eddy (Literacy Catch Up Teacher) is working with a focus group of students to improve their knowledge of phonics to promote confidence in reading. The phonics programme we are delivering this year is designed specifically for Key Stage 3. This programme guides students through the Alphabetic Code and it has been proven to be successful. The aim of this intervention is to improve reading and spelling by focusing on core word and sentence level skills using systematic synthetic phonics.

Dyslexic Gold

This online programme is specifically for students who have a reading age below 11 years. This intervention is programmed for key students during tutor times. We would also encourage all students who are undertaking this intervention to do this at home as well, in order to take full benefit of the scheme through homework.

Rapid Plus

This is an intervention solution for students who have not yet reached age related expectations, and students with Special Educational Needs. This intervention is programmed each week and it is taught in small groups led by a Learning Support Assistant. Students benefit from both fiction and non-fiction literature.

How is it going so far?

The student response to intervention sessions have been really positive, with many students discovering that their spelling and comprehension skills have improved, alongside a new confidence in reading aloud. Most students on the programme are now fully engaged with reading and have regular conversations with our librarian, Mrs. Coxon, to discuss what they would like to read next.
